Problem(s)

Due to reductions in household incomes, surging energy prices and relatively modest improvements in energy efficiency levels, National Energy Action (NEA) estimates that the number of households in fuel poverty across the UK is 6 million. NEA bases its projections on the 10% definition of fuel poverty which gives a realistic picture of the scale of fuel poverty in periods of more volatile energy prices². As of 1 January, the typical household pays £1,928 a year. In the Autumn Statement 2023 the Chancellor announced no new energy bill support for this winter.

Polling by NEA with YouGov revealed that 26% of UK adults – equivalent to 11 million people – say they have struggled to afford to pay their energy bills over the three months prior to the Autumn Statement. Help for fuel poor households is needed now more than ever. For people leaving prison with convictions, life is exceptionally challenging without the added pressures that stem from both the energy crisis and cost of living crisis. Overcoming barriers to employment, education, and housing are paramount to successful reintegration.

As of January 2023, more than 12 million people have a criminal record in the UK which is roughly 27% of the working population. The current labour shortages across the UK have made headlines and left businesses crying out for staff. From joining bonuses to bids to engage untapped 'talent pools', the crisis has forced the hand of employers who are now viewing inclusive hiring in a new light¹³

One such source of labour is people leaving prison with a conviction. As things stand, only one in seven people find a job within six months of leaving prison. For women this situation is exacerbated as women who commit crime are viewed more harshly by society. In a survey of 511 women 86% cited employment as a problem area with 51% believing the problem they faced having a criminal record was exacerbated by being a woman⁴. Nearly two thirds (59%) of women leaving prison had experienced domestic abuse as some point in their lives. Providing employment opportunities to women leaving prison is a crucial step towards reducing reoffending rates and helping them reintegrate into society; it is equally important to provide support and resources to help them overcome the challenges they face upon release. This project aims to breakdown these barriers by providing employment opportunities to women leaving prison with convictions, helping to build-up their employment history, increase their income, enhance their life skills, whilst simultaneously equipping them with understanding and knowledge on how to manage energy and provide advice and support to NEA's clients in fuel poverty.

Scope and Objectives

We believe passionately that everyone has the fundamental right to live in a warm, healthy, and affordable home, regardless of income or circumstance. Females with a criminal record face significant barriers gaining housing and employment following a custodial sentence. In addition, this may be a prerequisite to them regaining custody of their children if they have been taken into care following their incarceration.

Cadent will provide NEA with VCMA funding to deliver a 24 month project. The project aims to:

- Provide employment for up to 4 females on a part -time basis or 2 fulltime roles.
- NEA will lead delivery of the project working closely with A Fairer Chance, a CIC who work with employers, people with convictions and those at risk of offending to remove barriers to jobs and reduce crime and its impact on communities. They help employers recruit from a pool of talent they would not usually have access to whilst supporting individuals to use their skills and aspirations to find employment and reach financial freedom. They also provide a range of trauma informed, tailor made, interventions with the end goal of gaining sustainable employment.

Objectives

The success of the project will be measured by meeting the following objectives over 24 months;

- Securing 4 part-time or 2 full time jobs for women who have been previously incarcerated therefore helping to break the cycle of reoffending.
- Providing advice to 2,808 customers on CO safety, PSR awareness and energy efficiency in the home.

Why the Project is Being Funded Through the VCMA

We believe that this project meets the required company specific VCMA project eligibility criteria.

Project customers will access financial advice and realise additional household income, both of which may result in a customer being able to adequately heat their home to a healthy temperature.

We believe that this project goes outside of activities funded through other price control mechanisms due to:

- a) the types of support being delivered, and
- b) the method through which customers are to be engaged (e.g. not through Caden's BAU (business as usual) activities)
- e) Not be delivered through other external funding sources directly accessed by a GDN, including through other government (national, devolved, or local) funding.

This project will solely be delivered by Cadent's VCMA funding.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support

Cadent conducted and continues to obtain extensive stakeholder and customer engagement on its RIIO-GD2 business plans and subsequent VCMA delivery. For instance, we regularly seek to obtain the feedback of stakeholders such as Citizens Advice and National Energy Action (NEA) to understand the needs of customers in vulnerable situations. These regular conversations allow Cadent to gain feedback on the initiatives we are, or should be supporting, and ensure that our VCMA-funded projects are in the best interests of our customers.

Stakeholders have provided consistent feedback on the need for energy networks to focus their funding on supporting households most impacted by the cost-of-living crisis.

This project takes this feedback into account by creating a partnership with a trusted local charity, positioned in an area with levels of deprivation and fuel poverty significantly higher than the national average. Additionally, the customer demographic of >65 years old can be disproportionately impacted by fuel poverty, due to factors such as being more at risk of cold related illness, generally having lower levels of household income, and spending a greater proportion of time at home.

In terms of customer engagement, we asked customers for their views on which of the below statements best described their health and financial situation in 2022-2023, when compared to 2021:

- My current household's health or financial situation is worse off compared to 2021.
- My current household's health or financial situation is the same compared to 2021.
- My current household's health or financial situation is better off compared to 2021.

60% of participants responded that their households' health or financial situation was worse off this year compared to 2021 levels.

This project aims to act upon this customer insight and feedback, through supporting customers in Birmingham impacted by a downturn in their financial health. This will be achieved through offering services such as income maximisation and benefit entitlement checks along with a wraparound support service.

A report by Unlock, a charity which supports individuals with criminal records and funded by the Barrow Cadbury Trust specifically recommends a government workstream which recognises the particular challenges for women leaving prison.⁵. An estimated 17,000 children are affected by maternal imprisonment with only 9% cared for by their father when their mother is in prison. Half (50%) of women who have been involved in the criminal justice system, including conviction, caution or prison sentence, are claiming out-of-work benefits two years later, compared to just over a third (35%) of men.⁶

Without employment a mother is significantly less likely to be able to regain custody of her children as she will not have the means to support them.

Supporting women who have offended will have an indirect positive impact on any dependent children.
