Problem(s)	Based on various measures, Barking and Dagenham is one of London's most deprived boroughs. The Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2019, ranked the borough as the 21st most deprived local authority area in England (out of 317) and almost 50% of children are growing up in poverty. Barking Town is one of the three main towns in the borough and consists of wards that have neighbourhoods within the 10-30% most deprived in the country. 2
	The UK's current economic and social climate has resulted in residents living life precariously and more residents are at risk of even greater levels of poverty and deprivation. Likewise, fuel poverty. Being in fuel poverty means that these individuals are more susceptible to carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning, being in financial difficulties, and various physical and mental-health wellbeing related issues.
	Barking Churches Unite (BCU) is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation based in Barking that provides individuals with relief from poverty, disadvantage, isolation and homelessness in the borough. This is delivered via "The Source" which consists of multiple projects based at three sites: the Vicarage Field Shopping Centre, the Barking Learning Centre and the Source Warehouse. There, individuals can access a range of services from financial advice to food support and, a warm space. The work of "The Source" has grown significantly in line with the needs and demands of the borough and

BCU requires resources to adapt and expand its services and provisions to support individuals in crisis.

Scope and Objectives

Project scope

Cadent will invest £124,708.48 of VCMA funding to deliver a project from May 2024 to March 2026, in partnership with Barking Churches Unite (BCU).

The project will replicate the traditional Centre for Warmth model, whereby Cadent provides VCMA funding, resource, and training to a community centre to enable the provision of essential information and support on income maximisation, CO safety, energy efficiency advice and the priority services register (PSR).

BCU will use the funding to provide a range of services to local individuals living in vulnerable situations. BCU will:

- Employ a part-time Operations Director who will coordinate a focus on Cadent activities. The Operations Director will act as a project manager and ensure that the key elements of the project are incorporated across all of BCU centres, They will also ensure that staff have the knowledge, capacity and direction required to provide individuals with CO safety, energy efficiency and PSR advice, distribute leaflets, make income maximisation referrals and provide resources such as CO alarms (as applicable) to people living in a vulnerable situation.
- Employ a part-time advisor who will be based at The Source
 Warehouse site. The advisor will provide advice to individuals who
 visit the site for household support and provide additional advisory
 home visits. Due to the nature of the support provided at this location,
 the advisor will specialise in providing CO advice and CO alarms but
 will also offer advice on energy efficiency and the PSR via one-to-one
 conversations and distribute leaflets.
- Host a minimum of eight community events across the duration of the project. Individuals will receive support through attending the themed events that are hosted at the centres. The events will enable the provision of CO safety, energy efficiency and PSR advice, income maximisation referrals and resources such as CO alarms (as applicable).
- Deliver slow cooking classes and distribute slow cookers to individuals, promoting the cooking method as affordable, energy efficient and healthy. This work will complement other activities run from the Wellbeing Centre, which operates from the Vicarage Field Shopping Centre.
- Increase the working hours of existing staff in order to enable the delivery and coordination of the community events and slow cooking classes (including slow cooker distribution).

Project Objectives:

The project has several objectives that its success will be measured against:

- To generate a positive social return on investment see the below relevant section for more details.
- 2,750 individuals will receive energy efficiency advice including advice on ways to save both on energy consumption and costs through behaviour changes, energy saving measures, alternative tariffs and accessing available discounts and services.
- 300 individuals will receive slow cooker advice and learn how to cook affordable, healthy and efficient meals.

- 2,750 individuals will receive advice about the PSR, with the aim to sign up 187 eligible individuals to the register.
- 2,250 individuals will receive CO education to improve their CO safety awareness and the most at-risk households will also receive a CO alarm.
- Individuals will receive income maximisation support on a range of topics including money budgeting and debt management via referrals – 200 internal referrals will be made.
- Individuals at risk of loneliness and isolation will receive general support through the Centre for Warmth

Why the Project is Being Funded Through the VCMA

We believe that the project meets all of the Vulnerability and Carbon Monoxide Allowance eligibility criteria:

a. Have a positive, or a forecasted positive, Social Return on Investment (SROI) including for the gas consumers funding the VCMA Project:

The project delivers a positive forecasted social return on investment. This is based on achieving the target reach for income maximisation, registrations to the PSR and education on carbon monoxide. More information can be found in the relevant section below.

- b. Either:
- i. Provide support to consumers in Vulnerable Situations and relate to energy safeguarding, or,
- ii. Provide awareness of the dangers of CO, or,
- iii. Reduce the risk of harm caused by CO;

The project delivers services that meet all three elements of this criteria. For example, the specialist advisors will help households maximise their income, enabling residents to afford the cost of heating their home to an adequate level. The project will also raise awareness of the dangers of CO and promote registration to the PSR.

c. Have defined outcomes and the associated actions to achieve these:

Barking Churches Unite have entered into a service agreement that will contain the project objective and actions. Further detail can also be found below.

d. Go beyond activities that are funded through other price control mechanism(s) or required through licence obligations, and,

This method of delivering support to customers in vulnerable situations falls outside of Cadent's BAU activities and other licence conditions.

e. Not be delivered through other external funding sources directly accessed by a GDN, including through other government (national, devolved or local) funding,

This project will be solely delivered through Cadent's VCMA funding.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support

Cadent conducted extensive stakeholder and customer research in May 2022 following the completion of RIIO-GD2 year one and again after year two.

The aim of the research was to assess customer/stakeholder opinion on Cadent's allocation of VCMA spend and gain insight on where we should direct VCMA funding in the future. The "Energy Diaries" research piece

demonstrated that customers continue to support the key measures that we identified when developing our RIIO-2 plan. Some of the key highlights were:

- 61% of stakeholders (the highest proportion by individual category) supported Cadent increasing its VCMA allocation on projects aimed at tackling fuel poverty.
- Over 70% of customers are concerned about the level of their energy costs
- Very few customers understand their energy bill
- Less than 20% of customers feel as though they understand the range of support opportunities that they may be entitled to

Since, Cadent has worked with various stakeholders to feed into our strategic thinking and project prioritisation (in support of customers in vulnerable situations).

In February 2024, the Department for Energy Security & Net Zero published a fuel poverty factsheet summarising the headline estimates of fuel poverty in England, 2023. It found that 10.2% of households in London were classified as fuel poor last year, with rising energy prices moving 238,000 households in England into fuel poverty. Energy efficiency measures lifted 112,000 households out of fuel poverty between 2022 and 2023 and rising incomes (although offset by rising housing costs) moved 128,000 out of fuel poverty. Since inception, the Centres for Warmth model has focused on tackling fuel poverty by enabling energy efficiency advice and income maximisation support.

Therefore collectively, the evidence suggests there is a demand and benefit to implementing the Centres for Warmth project model in partnership with Barking Churches Unite to support individuals in vulnerable situations.

Information Required

Description

Outcomes, Associated Actions and Success Criteria

The project will form part of Cadent's wider Centres for Warmth network and aims to reach up to 2,750 individuals with a range of services. The Centre for Warmth project model relies on the provision of VCMA funding, materials and resource to a community centre located in an area of high deprivation, fuel poverty, and carbon monoxide risk. These provisions will enable the community centre to expand its existing support services.

Project Outcomes

The project aims to achieve the following outcomes:

- Individuals will report increased levels of household income.
- Individuals will report an increased awareness on the dangers of CO and have a reduced risk of harm caused by CO.
- Provide support to lonely and isolated residents, ensuring that they can access the community centre and the services it offers - tackling loneliness and isolation.
- Provide individuals with energy efficiency advice and individuals will report a better awareness of energy efficiency measures and support
- Individuals will report reduced levels of anxiety in fearing a utility outage and increased awareness of the PSR
- Individuals will report an increased knowledge of cooking on a budget, healthy cooking, and use of a slow cooker to save on energy.

Associated Actions

BCU will implement the following associated actions to deliver the project's outcomes: Centre staff will all receive Cadent training on the PSR, CO safety, and energy efficiency from their Cadent Centre for Warmth lead. Centre staff will have awareness conversations about the PSR and will help eligible households through the registration process. Centre staff will have CO awareness conversations and distribute CO alarms to the most at-risk households. The centre will coordinate slow cooking classes and the distribution of slow cookers. Centre's staff will provide energy efficiency advice to individuals. BAU will utilise the training, expertise and resources provided by Cadent. Learning Therefore, community organisations including Cadent's Centres for Warmth partners, have been under increased pressure to meet the growing demand to support individuals living in vulnerable situations. This project provides Cadent with the opportunity to understand the changing and continuing needs of communities and how to best support them with overcoming these challenges. Each area also has issues specific to the community being served and these are dealt with differently – including Barking. To help improve the impact of projects, Cadent will continue to listen to their partners to try to improve the support and services provided to individuals living in vulnerable situations. This will enable opportunities for cross network learning to ensure best practise is identified, transferred and implemented.
