Problem(s)	The Wishing Well is situated within Crewe Central ward. Despite the town's many strengths, Crewe has the highest levels of deprivation in the borough of Cheshire East. Unemployment levels are higher than the average for Cheshire East and qualification levels are generally poor. People living in this area are more likely to be living in poverty, deprivation and ill health which has a direct impact on quality of
	life and life expectancy. As well as this, the figures suggest that in these wards people are more likely to turn to a life of crime (often out of desperation) and are more vulnerable to excess alcohol consumption, substance misuse, and addiction.
	In Crewe and Nantwich there were 380 excess winter deaths over the last five years for which data is available, of which ² : 114 can be attributed to cold housing conditions. 76 can be linked to the coldest 25% of homes in Crewe and Nantwich 38 can be directly attributed to fuel poverty.
	The Wishing Well was founded in Crewe in 2002 to tackle health inequalities that were apparent within five wards within the town. A range of community-based projects from parenting courses, youth clubs, drop-in sessions, and lunch clubs for older people

Scope and Objectives	Project Scope	
	Cadent will invest £324,767.04 of VCMA funding to deliver a 23-month project in partnership The Wishing Well across 3 of their centres.	
	The 2024-2026 agreement will replicate other Centre for Warmth models, whereby specialist advisors are employed using VCMA funding.	
	The Wishing Well will use the funding to provide a range of services to local individuals living in vulnerable situations. The funding will be used to employ the following staff:	
	 A project manager Two part-time workshop facilitators and outreach workers A part-time administrator 	
	These members of staff will provide essential information and support on carbon monoxide (CO) safety, energy efficiency advice, and the Priority Services Register (PSR) along with slow cooking sessions. They will offer income maximisation advice to individuals and educate them on money management. Through Cadent's support they will be able to deliver transformative services within their local community.	
	Project Objectives	
	The Wishing Well will reach 5,000 individuals across the 23-month project.	
	The following objectives will be used to measure the success of this centre for warmth:	
	 Deliver the Cadent project across three centres. 2,400 individuals will receive energy efficiency advice. 400 individuals will receive a free slow cooker and learn how to cook affordable, healthy, and efficient meals. 2,400 individuals will receive income maximisation advice on a range of topics including money budgeting and debt management. 	
	 2,400 individuals will receive advice about the PSR, with the aim to sign up 1,600 eligible individuals to the register. 	
	5,000 individuals will receive CO education to improve their CO safety awareness.	
	 3,000 households will also receive a CO alarm. 575 individuals at risk of loneliness and isolation will receive widespread support through the Centre for Warmth.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support	In February 2024, the Department for Energy Security & Net Zero published a fuel poverty factsheet which summarises the headline estimates of fuel poverty in England in 2023.	
	Energy efficiency measures lifted 112,000 households out of fuel poverty between 2022 and 2023 and rising incomes (although offset by rising housing costs) moved 128,000 out of fuel poverty. A household's fuel poverty status depends on the interaction of energy efficiency, income, and energy prices.	
	Since its inception, the Centre for Warmth model has focused on tackling fuel poverty by enabling energy efficiency advice and income maximisation support to people living in vulnerable situations.	
Information Required	Description	
Outcomes, Associated Actions and Success Criteria	The Wishing Well, Centre for Warmth project will form part of Cadent's wider Centres for Warmth network and aims to reach 5,000 individuals across the three of their centres.	

The Centre for Warmth project model relies on the provision of VCMA funding, materials, and resources to a community centre located in an area of high deprivation, fuel poverty, and carbon monoxide risk.

These provisions will enable the community centre to expand its existing support for individuals living in vulnerable situations.

Project Outcomes

The project aims to achieve the following outcomes:

- Individuals will report increased levels of household income.
- Individuals will report an increased awareness on the dangers of CO and have a reduced risk of harm caused by CO.
- Provide individuals with energy efficiency advice and individuals will report a better awareness of energy efficiency measures and support.
- Individuals will report reduced levels of anxiety in fearing a utility outage and increased awareness of the PSR.
- Individuals will report an increased knowledge of cooking on a budget, healthy cooking, and use of a slow cooker to save on energy.
- Provide support to lonely and isolated residents, ensuring that they can access the community centre and the services it offers - tackling loneliness and isolation.
- Deliver the Cadent project across the three of their centres to ensure we reach as many individuals as possible.

Associated Actions

The Wishing Well will implement the following associated actions to deliver the project's outcomes through staff employed via the Cadent project:

- Individuals will report increased levels of household income through working with the centre's advisors working on a one-to-one basis.
- Centre staff will receive an awareness of the PSR and will help eligible households through the registration process.
- Individuals will report an increased awareness on the dangers of CO and have a reduced risk of harm caused by CO. This will be achieved through the centre's staff providing CO awareness conversations and distributing CO alarms to the most at-risk households.
- Individuals will report an increased knowledge of reducing their energy usage by using a slow cooker from attending a slow cooking session at the centre.
- Individuals will report a better awareness of energy efficiency measures. This will be achieved through the centre's staff providing energy efficiency advice to individuals.
- Individuals will report an improvement in their mental health because of attending the centre.
- The centre manager will co-ordinate the delivery of the Cadent project and schedule the workshops across all three of the centres.

	 2,400 individuals will receive energy efficiency advice including advice on ways to save both energy consumption and costs through behaviour changes, energy-saving measures, and available tools. 400 individuals will receive a slow cooker with advice and learn how to cook affordable, healthy, and efficient meals. 2,400 individuals will receive advice about the PSR, with the aim to sign up 1,600 eligible individuals to the register. 5,000 individuals will receive CO education to improve their CO safety awareness. 3,000 households will also receive a CO alarm. 2,400 individuals will receive income maximisation advice on a range of topics including money budgeting and debt management. 575 individuals at risk of loneliness and isolation will receive widespread support through the Centre for Warmth.

Potential for New Learning	Every area within Cadent's network sees households suffering from the same issues, fuel poverty and low-income. Cadent have learned that each area also has issues specific to them and these are dealt with differently.	
	To help increase cross-network understanding Cadent have set up a forum for the Centres for Warmth. Every quarter we will meet and discuss diverse topics, share stories, tips, and best practice but most importantly share resources.	
	Where possible, Cadent will continue to listen to their partners to try to improve the support and services provided to customer living in a vulnerable situation.
