Problem(s)	Trafford Veterans was established eight years ago by veterans who struggled to access support from local authorities or national veteran support organisations. Although there are a number of national charities supporting the military community, they are somewhat fragmented. Trafford Veterans won a Kings Award for provided food parcels and other support to the veteran community during covid however they continue to face funding challenges as the unique nature of the veteran community is not recognised.
	Academic research into the transition to civy street identified. "Veterans continue to seek information to better facilitate what

can be a confusing navigation in an unfamiliar civilian world. Families and friends may be involved in bridging the gap between service and veteran. They too need tailored information and advice about how they can support veterans and understand the possible impact on their own wellbeing and seek the support available. Veterans should feel confident in seeking help and in accessing services that generate awareness about their specific needs and what they may be experiencing in post military life. For this to happen effectively, staff need a better understanding about their role in supporting veterans and why this is particularly important for this specific group".1.

Scope and Objectives

Cadent's VCMA funding will be used to provide support for veterans and their families both via drop-in sessions and mobile support unit but also via outreach for those who cannot travel or wish to maintain confidentiality. It will contribute towards the cost of running the mobile service and the hire of the venues used for the breakfast club and other drop-in sessions allowing participation by those who cannot afford to contribute financially. It will also offer cookery lessons using produce from fareshare which is purchased weekly at a nominal cost.

Its specific objectives are as follows

- Income maximisation advice **150** Individuals
- Eco availability and measures 50 individuals
- Efficient use of Appliances **120** Individuals
- Heating and water controls 120 Individuals
- Priority Services registration- 100 Individuals
- Alleviate loneliness and Isolation 200 Individuals
- Provision of a slow cooker 20 Individuals

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support

The armed forces covenant recognises the unique sacrifices that the members of the armed forces make in defending the nation including sacrificing some civilian freedoms, facing danger and sometimes suffering serious injury or death as a result. It also recognises the role their families play in supporting them. In return the nation has a moral obligation toward the members of the Naval Service, the Army and the Royal Air Force and their families. They deserve our respect and support and fair treatment.²

This obligation involves the whole of society: including voluntary and charitable organisations, private organisations, and individuals in supporting the Armed Forces. Recognising those who have performed military duty unites the country and demonstrates the value of their contribution.

Project outcomes

The project will provide support via one of its community drop-in sessions which take place across Trafford or via its community outreach bus. They also deliver food parcels and other support to those unable to travel to group sessions. As the staff and volunteers have a relationship with the individuals' and their families, they will be encouraging them firstly to sign the priority services register whilst also identifying that they are claiming the benefits to which they are entitled. Veterans are immensely proud, so this has to be managed in a very sympathetic manner. They will also be advising them on energy efficiency including safe use of appliances and making them aware of the importance of both having a CO alarm and how to use it correctly. When appropriate they will refer them for a gas safety check or support via services beyond the meter. They will be running slow cooker lessons where they will provide participants with their own slow cooker. As the organisation has a relationship with fareshare they will be linking this activity to produce available which could be suitable for slow cooking.

Complex PTSD and loneliness is a significant issue for veterans of all ages. In addition to a monthly breakfast club which is attended by up to 80 veterans and their families there is also a Friday lunch club, a model and crafting club, walking football, an allotment club and Military records. They also visit those living alone or in care homes when they are unable to attend.

The partnership with Trafford Veterans expects to achieve the following objectives

Priority Services registration- 100 Individuals Alleviate loneliness and Isolation – **200** Individuals Providing slow cooker and training and 20 Individuals **Project Actions** Trafford Veterans staff and Volunteers will receive training on energy efficiency to increase individual awareness of how to manage energy efficiently in the home. Trafford Veterans staff and Volunteers will receive training on the PSR and will help eligible households through the registration process. Trafford Veterans staff and Volunteers will receive training on CO awareness and general gas safety awareness. Trafford Veterans staff and Volunteers will receive training on Services Beyond the meter, both the eligibility criteria and the process for referring those in need. Cadent will supply Trafford Veterans with CO Alarms to distribute to the most at-risk households. **Project Partners and Third** Cadent will work principally with Trafford Veterans Parties Involved **Potential for New Learning** The Trafford Veterans outreach project offers many potential areas for learning that Cadent can adapt for other VCMA funded projects in RIIO-GD2. One of the main rationales behind funding this project was the number of veterans in the Trafford area living in vulnerable situations and in fuel poverty. This was an area that Cadent had not previously focused on or were aware of its unique challenges. The organisation is run by veterans who understand both the physical and practical challenges faced by veterans and the barriers to engagement. One of these is the ability of individuals to travel due to age or vulnerability. Therefore, in addition to its current locations, from May the project will have a community bus which will travel to those unable to attend its current venues. Although there are a number of large organisations supporting ex-military many individuals still struggle to access services and face multiple referrals. By working directly with the veteran community via a single organisation we hope to gain both qualitative and quantitative evidence which can be compared against partner led projects. We can also make a direct comparison between the numbers accessing the mobile services as opposed to the fixed venues.
