Problem(s)	The impact of the rising cost of living due to increased home energy bills as well as loneliness and rural isolation is a significant challenge for older people in Herefordshire and parts of Worcestershire. There are currently warm spaces, but these are only for a few hours a week and insufficient to meet the demand. Warm spaces provide both a safe, warm space to attend and companionship but also the opportunity to discuss other issues which may be impacting them. Digital exclusion is a significant issue and can limit the confidence and ability of older people to seek advice and support and importantly to access the help that may be available to them as the majority of services are now online. <b>Cost of Living</b> A recent survey by Age UK National highlighted that three-
	quarters of older people in the UK – 9.4 million people – are worried about the cost of living. Over half of those surveyed said

	they will have to heat their homes less and 24% said they will
	need to choose between eating and heating their homes this
	winter. Fuel poverty disproportionally affects older people with a
	fifth of households affected having at least one household
	member aged 60+. The West Midlands has the highest
	proportion of fuel poor households in the country. In
	Herefordshire 14,145 households are deemed to be living in fuel
	poverty, this accounts for 16.7% of the population. In
	Worcestershire just over 40,000 households are living in fuel
	poverty which accounts to 15.4% of homes in the county. In
	Herefordshire, income levels are reported to be significantly
	lower than the national average.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support	Cadent has sought the views of a wide range of stakeholders to

	Cadent conducted extensive stakeholder engagement to gather
	the views of organisations on its year one VCMA delivery.
	Cadent obtained stakeholder feedback on individual projects
	(e.g. the model of charity-delivered energy efficiency advice)
	and categories of activities (e.g. tackling affordability and fuel
	poverty).
	With regards to categories of activities, tackling affordability and
	fuel poverty saw the highest percentages of support for
	increasing funds, with 61% of stakeholders and 43% of
	customers supporting an increase in funding when compared to
	2021-2022 levels.

	When looking at specific projects from the first year of VCMA
	delivery, 61% of stakeholders supported increases in funding in
	income maximisation activities, with one customer (aged 30-)
	commenting "income maximisation can be the step to someone
	going into debt or becoming vulnerable".
	Additionally, Cadent asked stakeholders and customers for
	feedback on where VCMA funding should be prioritised in 2022-
	2023. Stakeholders commented " We are in the midst of an
	energy crisis which is likely to continue for the next 18 months to
	2 years and will leave clients in very vulnerable situations. Any
	increase in this support from Cadent would be extremely helpful
	to fuel poor clients".

Outcomes, Associated Actions and Success Criteria	The project focuses on customer vulnerabilities due to age and
	additional factors including bereavement, illness, loneliness, and
	income challenges. The support is organised on a local basis via
	co-ordinated group activities and 1:1 support. It covers a wide

range of activities from social events to slow cooking lessons and practical advice on energy efficiency and scam prevention.

Success will be measured by the number of participants engaged in the activities below and the level of positive engagement from those who access additional support. It is anticipated that not all participants will be experiencing financial hardship however for those living alone, experiencing symptoms of early dementia or with a partner who has a life limiting illness this may support them in dealing with grief which could impact their personal health.

Group sessions - Maintenance Cognitive Stimulation Therapy (MCST) for those with mild to moderate dementia, Creative Arts, Crafty Cuppa, Walking, bereavement support 4896 clients over a 2-year period

Home Energy Advice/ Handyperson – 1728 interventions over a 2-year period

Income maximisation- 1152 interventions over a 2-year period

Drybridge/ Stourport, hot meals companionship, slow cooker course -1080 clients over a 2-year period

DWS Anticipatory Grief, Admin @ Home Group sessions Home Energy Advice Income Max Warm Hubs Bereavement Support- 720 clients over a 2-year period

Staff follow the ethos of making every contract count where routine interactions include advice on improving health and wellbeing. It is therefore anticipated that those co-ordinating the programmes will build relationships with participants and gain an understanding of their individual financial circumstances and any practical challenges they may be facing which may include issues with keeping warm or healthy eating. This should increase the probability of their offer of support with applications for pension credit or other benefits being accepted.

<ul> <li>many potential areas of learning that Cadent can adopt for of VCMA – funded projects in RIIO-GD2.</li> <li>One of the main rationales behind funding the project is their outreach work with those customers in rural communities who may be experiencing vulnerability due to age but will addition factors including bereavement, anticipatory grief, illness, loneliness, and income challenges which Cadent projects hav not directly focused on. They will provide practical support vith claiming additional benefits including pension credit and care allowance which many clients are unaware of the eligibility criteria. They will also provide an opportunity for socialisation including general social activities for example walking or cookery lessons but also specific support for those experience symptoms of early dementia, supporting someone with a life limiting illness or who have experienced a bereavement.</li> <li>When assessing the options for VCMA projects, we consider the effectiveness of engaging directly with customers rather than via a project partner. This project will provide insight into the year on only trusted members of the community, but they have experience in dealing with the more complex personal issues which elderly customers can face.</li> <li>This partnership with will also provide Cadent with learning or customers' receptiveness to support form Gas Distribution Networks during an energy crisis.
