Problem(s)	The Rock Community Hub Ltd is located in Grimsby on Cadent's East Midlands network. Grimsby's most deprived area is East Marsh where The Rock Foundation is based. There are problems of low educational attainment, low employment, high number of lone parents and high "in work" and pensioner poverty. Many of the residents within Grimsby are struggling with rising living costs. Fuel, food, and energy bills have risen, and many are struggling to make ends meet. The Rock Foundation understands it is important that people know what support is available and they are supported to maximise their income. In response to this, the Rock Foundation and Cadent have identified a need to help those who are struggling financially with their key bills, such as: rent, council tax, energy, water and food. The service prioritises those people who have no one else to help and who are the most vulnerable. It is proposed that with Cadent's funding the proposed Centre for Warmth will be able to provide those vulnerable individuals with the help and support they require.
Scope and Objectives	Cadent will invest VCMA funding in the The Rock Foundation Community Hub Ltd, Grimsby, to deliver a two-year Centre for Warmth project. The Rock Community Hub is part of The Rock Foundation. This started in 2008 to provide new and unique provision for young people and adults with learning disabilities and those who are disadvantaged and vulnerable. The two-year agreement replicates the previous project model in other Centres for Warmth, whereby specialist benefits advisors are employed using the VCMA. This service provided

vulnerable households with essential financial support and created a very strong SROI.
The Rock Community Hub currently runs a very busy food bank with 400 + members. The Hub has recently acquired a new building and now has office space to offer an advice service. The Hub requires support from Cadent as follows:
 One advice worker who can offer advice on income maximisation, benefits, carbon monoxide (CO) awareness, energy efficiency advise and support signups to the Priority Service Register (PSR). The advice worker will facilitate sessions to raise awareness around CO and PSR and offer free CO alarms to those who need one and cannot afford to purchase one. The advice worker will offer support and advice on income maximisation and applying for benefits. Employ one part-time staff member to assist with project delivery and running the centre. The hub will offer slow cooking sessions to help educate customers on healthy and more efficient ways of cooking. The hub will supply Cadent with a quarterly report on numbers attending all advice sessions. The hub enquires funding to help with running costs of the building to keep the doors open.
This project aims to reach 900 individuals over the two-year project and will be divided as below:
 900 individuals will receive advice on income maximisation and support to claim previously unclaimed benefits. 900 individuals will receive advice on energy efficiency helping them to reduce their energy costs. 900 individuals will receive advice on the dangers of CO. 400 individuals will receive a free CO alarm. 900 individuals will receive advice on the PSR helping to keep them safe in their home and give them peace of mind in an outage. 400 individuals will receive advice and a slow cooker to help them cook more efficiently and healthier. 900 individuals will attend the activities and sessions which will help alleviate loneliness and isolation.

Cadent will measure the success of the Centre for Warmth- The Rock Community Hub Ltd against the achievement of the following objectives over the two-year project.
 To deliver income maximisation/ benefit advice to 900 individuals. To deliver energy efficiency advice to 900 individuals. To deliver CO advice to 900 individuals. To supply 400 individuals with a free CO alarm. To deliver PSR advice to 900 individuals. To support 400 individuals to sign up to the PSR. To deliver slow cooking advice to 100 individuals.

Evidence of Stakeholder/Customer Support	Cadent conducted further research in May 2022. The aim was to assess customer/stakeholder opinion on Cadent's allocation of VCMA spend and gain insight on where we should direct VCMA funding in the future. The results of our research studies, including our Energy Diaries thought leadership programme, are	

	available to view on the Cadent website. However, we've captured some of the key evidence below.	
	 61% of stakeholders (the highest proportion by individual category) supported Cadent increasing its VCMA allocation on projects aimed at tackling fuel poverty. Over 70% of customers are concerned about the level of their energy costs. Very few customers understand their energy bill. Less than 20% of customers feel as though they understand the range of support opportunities that they may be entitled to. There is very low trust associated with energy companies. 	
	This project focusses on tackling fuel poverty by offering energy/income advice to at risk households.	
	Cadent work with over 40 strategic partners to continually feed into our strategic thinking and project prioritisation (in support of customers in vulnerable situations). The Centres for Warmth initiative has proven a huge success and receives excellent feedback from charities such as National Energy Action and Age UK. We use the ongoing engagement with these key partners to inform our decision making, as we have with this project.
